## Bucks County BKA Spring Seminar

The Bucks County Beekeepers Spring Seminar 2017 will be held on February 11th, 10:30-16:00 at Wendover Memorial Hall, Wharf Rd, HP22 6HF. The County Committee have done an exceptional job in securing three outstanding speakers for this year's Seminar. Between them there is over 140 years of beekeeping experience. Clive de Bruyn, author of Practical Beekeeping will be talking about "The Importance of Pollen" whilst Gerry Collins, a regular contributor to BBKA News, will give a talk entitled "What's Going On in My Hive?" and John Whitaker, a member of the BBKA Examination Board, will present "Beekeeping with a Bandsaw". ## Asian Hornet Monitoring Traps

With the discovery and destruction of an Asian Hornet nest in Tetbury late in 2016 what should we be doing in Buckinghamshire in 2017? According to the National Bee Unit [website](#) we should be putting out traps to monitor for the arrival of the Asian Hornet. You will see from the adjacent image that the life cycle of the Asian Hornet differs from that of the wasp which as beekeepers we usually set out traps for in the Autumn. The hibernating queens can emerge as early as February. The queen will build an initial small nest possibly close to the ground. Later in the season this nest may develop into a larger nest or the colony moves to establish the larger nest. This means that monitoring traps should be in place by February. Because the early season traps should be set up to catch queens the bait should be sweet as she is looking build up her energy for nest building and rearing young.

During the summer months the bait in the traps should be changed to being meat or fish based. During this period the traps are set to catch workers who will predate honeybees as well as other insects. Like wasps, late in the season when the new queens have mated the nests are abandoned so the traps should again be set with sweet bait to attract the newly mated queens before they hibernate.

The problem with putting out traps is that they can also attract other insects such as early bumblebees. The traps therefore need to be checked regularly and innocent insects released.



## Which Hornet Trap?

There seem's to be a plethora of traps appearing on the market, Thorne's are promoting the [veto-pharma](#) trap which includes attractant. The NBU has an instruction sheet for a [DIY trap](#) which looks very much like a classic wasp trap. The BBKA has a reusable [wasp trap](#). Vita are marketing a floor [unit](#) which does not require bait as the colony itself is the attractant.

The key seems to be to have a trap that can be checked easily and regularly. The bait should be easy to regularly change. From recycling to tens of pounds the choice is yours, but please use your trap sensibly and release non-invasive insects.

## Upgrading website

You may have noticed that this month's Newsletter arrived via MailChimp. As part of some significant changes to our website and membership communications we are trialling the use of MailChimp to deliver broadcast emails to our membership.

The benefits of using an email broadcast system such as MailChimp include more secure email transfer, reporting on effectiveness of the emails and in the longer term being able to deliver more interactive communication. In December we moved the hosting provider for our website and Association email. Once the move has bedded in we hope to launch a new website.
